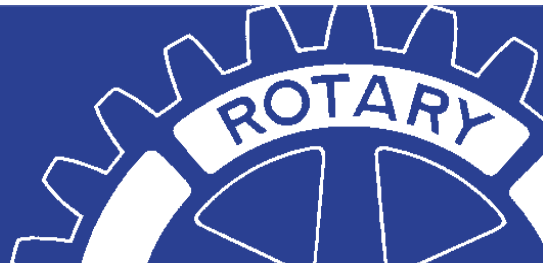

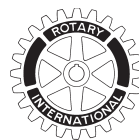

MEMBER PROFILE: ROBIN CORKERY



Getting to know Robin Corkery requires some thinking. His invocations require some thinking. He asks questions of speakers that require some thinking. He has set some high standards for himself, but says he has had an easy life. Here is his story. You figure it out.

Robin was born in Spokane, and when he was 6 accompanied his family to Europe where his father coordinated

the U.S. effort to resettle World War II refugees. Robin became fluent in German and developed a perspective on life a bit different from that of the typical American kid. After 5 years, the family moved back to the U.S. where Robin completed junior high and high school, and then went to Notre Dame. When he lost interest in studying he joined the Marines where he was a rifleman first and then repaired teletype machines. After 3 years in the Marines he returned to Notre Dame, where he was on the Dean's List and graduated with a degree in government.

Robin spent 35 years with Merrill Lynch, first as a stockbroker in San Fran-

cisco where he was the top producer, then in management in New York and Los Angeles. He returned to Spokane with Merrill Lynch in 1989 and retired in 2000. He attributes his success to being a good listener and to the trust his clients had in him.

Robin is on the Program Committee. He has been a birder for 25 years and always enjoys adding a new bird to his life list. His reading recently ranged from Paradise Lost to Mark Twain's "Life on the Mississippi" to books on Islam. In 1989 he was a "Jeopardy" winner. He enjoys the fellowship of Rotary.

MEMBER PROFILE: JAMES S. SHAW



Dr. Jim has been in the doctoring business since he was a kid in New Hampshire. His dad was a General Practice Doc and would take Jim with him on house calls. It was the caring for people that the young Dr. Jim was most attracted to. That caring has been a common thread throughout his life.

After graduating from college Jim taught biology and chemistry for two years. He then went back and completed medical school. His explanation was that he had had a little too much fun in college so it took a while to get accepted into Medical School. Teaching was a great opportunity because in the course of teaching he learned how to study better himself.

Dr. Jim was a family practice doc for 25 years and loved every minute of it. In 1996 he served on a task force for a project called Providence Center for Faith and Healing. Two years later he was its medical director. As Dr. Jim explained traditionally science and spirituality were kept separate. Even though there was a separation he said that there was plenty of anecdotal evidence of healing that the medical people could not explain. I wondered if they still billed for that but did not ask. Dr Jim went on to say that when patients were asked what made a difference they indicated it was the caring. A 1996 Gallup poll showed that 40% of patients would like their medical professional to pray with them. The task of Providence center was to blend the Science and the Spiritual without coercion or proselytizing. Their approach is to ask open ended questions such as: "How do you get through this?" or "What gives

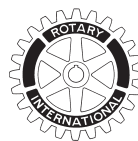
you hope?" The medical person then responds to the patients whole needs as directed by their responses.

The Providence Center has in its arsenal a private landscaped space that has a natural creek and a man-made waterfall. This serves as peaceful green space for prayer, meditation, relaxing or just lunch. Another tool in the Center is Humor Care. This includes a cart that has funny videos, funny books, etc. Dr. Jim says I can write an order for morphine, the humor cart and ten minutes at the waterfall.

Jim is always mindful of his mother's words that said, "You have been given these gifts for a reason." He has volunteered his gifts three times to help refugees in the Congo.

Dr. Jim has been married 38 years and has three grown children.

MEMBER PROFILE: TYRUS TENOLD

Tyrus is busy and accomplished and makes it all look easy. He is a WSU graduate in business, has been married to Kathy, a 6th grade teacher, for 26 years. His two boys are both Eagle Scouts. One is a senior in college and the other is a Marine lieutenant. His daughter is a freshman in college. He is an avid outdoor guy who loves to snow and water ski.

Tyrus runs Spokane Industries along with his two brothers Greg and Bob. Their dad John, who was a club 21 Rotarian, started this business in 1952. It has grown to three divisions consisting of a Steel Foundry, Precision Casting and Metal Products. They manufacture products as varied as rock crusher parts, aircraft refuelers, wine and beverage tanks, and parts for Gerber knives. It was his company that made the big ring that squirts water from the top on the Club 21 downtown fountain. The business occupies 240,000 square feet with 300 employees. Tyrus says he grew up in the plant and has worked in every part of it.

In 1983 the rock crusher manufacturing division that Tyrus ran was sold. He used this as an opportunity to take a brief 13 year hiatus from the company. His desire was to develop his own wings and fly on his own. He built a company called Super Color. It grew to have three separate portrait studios and three photo labs. During this time Tyrus became and remains active in the Downtown business community. He has served as a board member for Medical Service Company and SEACAB (sports, entertainment, arts and convention advisory board) to name a few. In 1996 he sold the photo business and returned to Spokane Industries with an even greater set of business skills.

He wondered why he should be picked to be interviewed as he didn't consider himself very interesting.

He says that he is passionate about Rotary because of the people and the projects.
